





- Tonopah Garage & Gallery Grey 5 Campbell & Kelly Building

This structure was built around 1912 and became known as the Campbell & Kelly Building in 1915 when Horace P. Campbell and Reuben "Rube" Kelly purchased it to expand their business. Campbell & Kelly operated the local foundry and machine shop.

This structure was built in 1906 and became home to the largest store in Central Nevada, the H.A. McKim Company. In the 1940's, it was home to the Ramona Club and Hotel. This building has been vacant for many decades.


The Brougher-Govan Block was built in 1905 and originally housed a bank. At the time, the Mizpah was a one-story wooden building housing a café and grill. Construction of the Mizpah Hotel started in 1907 and was completed in 1908. By 1909, the second and third floors of the Brougher-Govan Block were annexed and converted to hotel rooms. The Mizpah underwent major renovations in 2011. Today, it houses a hotel, restaurant, meeting rooms, a bar, and many famous ghosts, including the Lady

13 Tonopah Liquor Company (TLC)

Built in 1906, the Tonopah Liquor Company was one of several stone structures on Main Street built during a Tonopah boom. A lot of original features remain today, including the impressive polychrome interior ceiling. Today, the TLC houses a bar with a whiskey club, apartments, and a haunted basement.

Event Plaza, Tonopah Mural and Frank Golden Block

This is the oldest stone structure on Main Street, completed in December of 1902, and was home to Frank Golden's jewelry store as well as a bank, drug store, saloon, and law offices. It symbolizes the transition of Tonopah from a tent camp to a permanent town. Today it houses retail shop Vanwood Variety Store and is home to the Tonopah Masonic



Brokers Exchange/Tonopah Divide Mining Company Building

Originally constructed in 1905 as a two-story building, this structure was remodeled in 1919 after a fire destroyed the second floor. Today, it is home to the Tonopah Volunteer Fire Department and known as "Station 2".

16 U.S.O. Club Building and Mural

The United Service Organization (U.S.O.) was formed in 1941 by President Roosevelt. The Tonopah U.S.O. Club was built sometime before 1944. Blueprints from 1944 show plans to remodel the "Civic Auditorium" to create the U.S.O. Club. The structure has housed the Tonopah Convention Center for decades. It is home to many events, fundraisers, weddings, meetings, and is a central location for Nevada conventions.

17 Tonopah Public Library

Built in 1906, the Tonopah Library is the longest continuously operating library in Nevada. Suffrage Leader Marjorie Moore Brown and her mother, Grace R. Moore, were instrumental in sponsoring fundraising events for the construction of the library. Because more modern facilities were needed, a new building was constructed next door and it serves as the main library today. The historic library, which is still in use, houses an extensive collection of Nevada reference

State Bank and Trust Company Building and Nevada Club Mural

Construction of this five-story structure started in 1906 and was completed in 1907. Only four months after opening in Tonopah, the bank closed its doors permanently. Over the years, the building has become known as the Belvada as it was home to the Belvada Apartments, housing many members of the Army Air Forces and their families. After major renovations, it now houses the Belvada Hotel and Coffee Shop.

19 Jim Butler Inn & Suites

20 Wieland Brewery

This structure is the oldest stone building in Tonopah. It was built in 1901, when most of Tonopah was still a tent camp, as liquor storage for the Wieland Brewery. Today it houses the Old Brewery Hostel

21 Water Company of Tonopah Building

At the start of Tonopah's growth, water was sold by the bucket or barrel. By 1902, Tonopah had three water companies. The Water Company of Tonopah built this structure as its office in 1909. The structure retains its original architectural integrity today and is part of the Town and Tonopah Public Utilities Offices.

22 Fire House and Gymnasium

Tonopah had its first major fire in May 1904 during which Tonopah's volunteer fire department proved ineffective. The Fire House was built in 1907 and 1908 in the center of town. Despite the addition of paid firefighters, adequate fire protection was never achieved. Major fires in 1908 and 1912 caused heavy losses in Tonopah. The firehouse was damaged by a fire in 1920 and restored to its present condition. Today, it houses the Tonopah Public Utilities maintenance shop.

This structure is the oldest building on Main Street as confirmed by photographs of the 4th of July celebration in 1902. The land was sold in May of 1901 by Jim Butler, Wilse Brougher, Tasker Oddie, and Frank Higgs. Many of Main Street's wood structures looked similar at the time but either burned in fires or were replaced by more modern buildings. This building


housed the Apex Meat Market in 1902 and George F. Blakeslee's Jewelry Store for many years after that. Blakeslee was the watch inspector for the mines. Today, this structure is home to Van-Tastic

United States Post Office & Big Bill Monument

This structure was built in 1941 during a boom in Tonopah's economy due to World War II. It has served as the local post office ever since. Tonopah residents receive their mail in post office boxes, making this building one of the most frequented

42 Old Nye County Courthouse

This structure was completed in 1905 after the Nye County seat was moved from Belmont, Nevada to Tonopah. Additions were built in 1907 and 1968. It served as the Nye County Courthouse until about 1996 when construction of the new courthouse was completed. The Old Courthouse now houses community organizations.
